#### Issue:

Whether Charlotte County Code of Ordinances ("Code"), Section 3-2-42(g)(1), authorizes the Charlotte County Construction Industry Licensing Board (CILB) to add additional workers' compensation or federal insurance requirements to minimum standards for certificates of competency for local and registered contractors.

#### Brief Response:

CILB is not authorized to amend the Code to add additional workers' compensation or federal insurance requirements to minimum standards for certificates of competency for local and registered contractors. Only the Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) has the authority to amend the Code, and even though the BOCC may amend the Code, any amendments must not be inconsistent with state law.

#### Discussion:

Charlotte County is a home rule charter county, and, except as may be limited by its charter, has all county and municipal powers of self-government granted now, or in the future, by the constitution, not inconsistent with general law, or with special law approved by vote of the electors. A local government enactment, such as a local ordinance, is inconsistent with state law if (1) the legislature has expressly or impliedly preempted a particular subject area, or (2) the local enactment conflicts with a state statute.

Florida Statutes §125.01(2)(t) authorizes BOCC to "Adopt ordinances and resolutions necessary for the exercise of its powers and prescribe fines and penalties for the violation of ordinances in accordance with law". Charlotte County's charter requires that "The adoption of all ordinances shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of the total membership of the board of county commissioners".

CILB was created to make <u>policy recommendations</u> to the BOCC with respect to the functioning, supervision, and administration of the simultaneously created Charlotte County Building Construction Services Department. Despite the broad, dated, and somewhat conflicting language of the Code, regarding certificates of competency, the BOCC cannot delegate its ability to adopt ordinances and resolutions to the CILB.

The BOCC has adopted current competency qualifications which are codified in the Code at Section 3-2-22 and, separately, the requirements of the Workers' Compensation Law of the State of Florida (codified in Section 3-2-48) and general liability insurance requirements.

The CILB may make a recommendation to the BOCC to adopt additional longshoreman's and harbor worker's compensation insurance as a condition of a certificate of competency; however, the proposed imposition is improper, where, as of July 1, 2021, licensing of occupations is expressly preempted to the State of Florida and supersedes any local government licensing requirements. Local licensing for occupations as of July 1, 2021 will sunset on July 1, 2023, and a local government may not add additional licensing requirements to the existing licensing requirements during this time. Florida Statutes §163.211.

Therefore, the proposed enactment of an ordinance to add longshoreman's and harbor worker's compensation insurance as a condition of a certificate of competency is inconsistent with state law where the legislature has expressly preempted the licensing of occupations and prohibited the BOCC from imposing additional licensing requirements.

The Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) is the government agency responsible for licensing and regulating (including enforcement) businesses and professionals in the State of Florida. Contractor violations of the Florida Administrative Code requirements to maintain the applicable workers' compensation and general liability insurance as required by state and federal law including, but not limited to, the provisions of the Longshore and Harbor Workers' Compensation Act may be reported directly to DBPR.

#### Conclusion

The Code does not authorize the CILB to amend the Code to add additional workers' compensation or federal insurance requirements to minimum standards for certificates of competency for local and registered contractors. Only the BOCC has the authority to amend the Code, and even though the BOCC may amend the Code, state law prohibits the BOCC from imposing additional licensing requirements.
